As the co-executor of the literary estate of Rebecca West, I would like to give profound thanks for help with compiling this collection, which involved an exciting adventure in literary archaeology. In the summer of 2007, Rebecca West scholars Bernard Schweizer, Ann Norton and Debra Rae Cohen came with me on a trip to Tulsa, Oklahoma to dig through the archives at the McFarlin Special Collections at the University of Tulsa.
